Opening Times

April-September (Daily) 9.00am - 7.00pm.
October-March (Daily) 9.00am - 4.00pm.

Parking

12 parking bays for disabled users with tarmac surface and dropped kerbs. There is a 2m overhead barrier at the entrance to the car park. Minibuses and small coaches are welcome with prior notice: telephone the Country Parks Office on 0116 3056918, 9-5pm, Monday to Friday, for details.

Trails

All paths are surfaced with tarmac, gravel or concrete, and form a series of loops around the site. Gradients are quite gentle, easy for motorised wheelchairs, but the steeper sections (marked with a gradient on the map) may be difficult for manual wheelchairs and push chairs. Benches are located at points along the trails for resting. **Please note:** There is no barrier along the canal edge so care should be taken.

Facilities

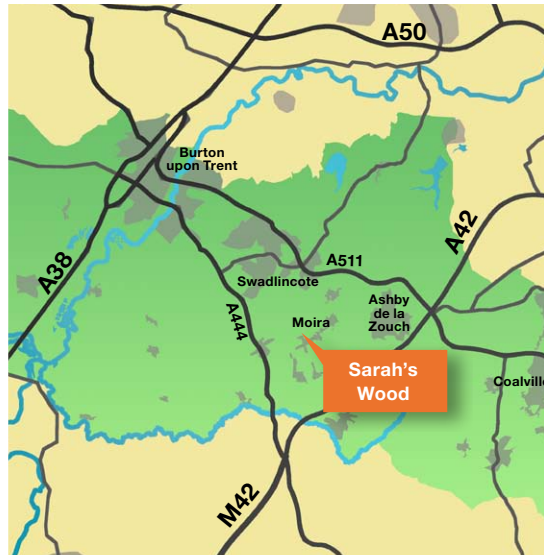
Shelter and disabled toilets are located adjacent to the car park. An all abilities children's playground can be found 60m from the car park.

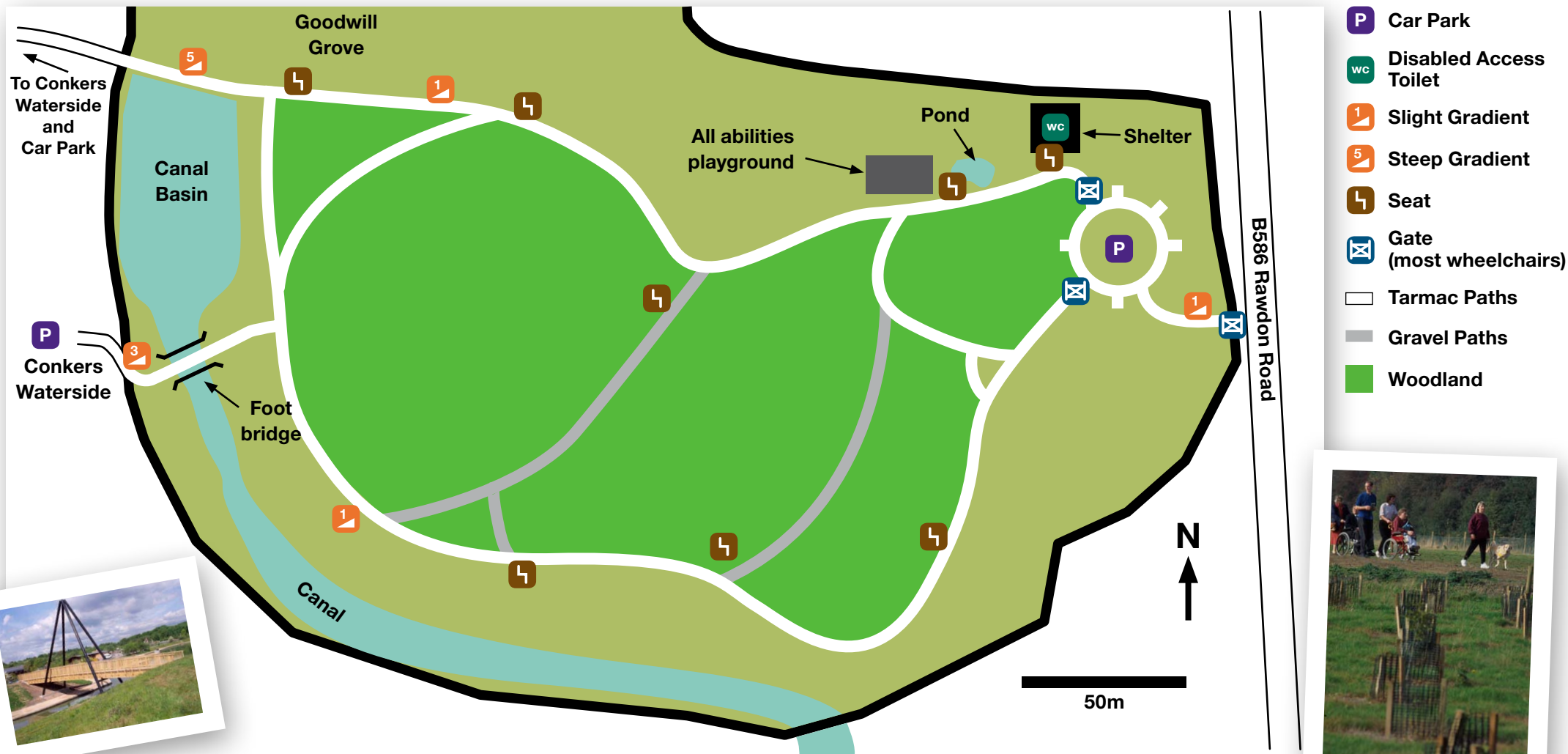

Sarah's Wood

Sarah's Wood is a 10 hectare (25 acre) woodland on the edge of Moira, designed with the aim of providing an accessible woodland for all. It was created by Leicestershire County Council, the National Forest Company and SOS (Stars Organisation Supporting Action for People with Cerebral Palsy), a charity working for children and adults with cerebral palsy. The woodland was given its name as a result of a competition run by the Leicester Mercury newspaper. The winning name was chosen in recognition of the support that Sarah Louise Goudie, a five year old child suffering from cerebral palsy, had given to the SOS woodland appeal. So, in October 1995, the new woodland was officially named 'Sarah's Wood' in her honour. SOS Member Alan Titchmarsh planted the first trees in the new woodland.

Sarah's Wood has a long and interesting history. Archaeological finds, including an Iron Age grinding stone (or quern) and a prehistoric axe handle, indicate that there has been farming of one form or another on the site since the Iron Age. Today, Sarah's Wood has transformed into an attractive woodland and wildlife haven, comprising native broadleaf trees, hedgerows and a hay meadow. Memorial trees to Mahatma Gandhi and Anne Frank are planted in the Gandhi Goodwill Grove. Sarah's Wood lies next to the restored Ashby Canal, and a footbridge provides access over the canal to the Conkers Waterside Visitor Centre.
